Magee opened the 1ST Call to the Public.

Reese Morris, 2481 Oakview Drive, stated he has lived in the Village for 10 years. He stated he is very interested in soccer at the park. He stated he currently coaches soccer. He stated he and his wife love this area because of all of the parks. He thinks it shows the community cares about kids and families. He stated he believes soccer and sports in general are a big part of that. He supports the fields going in and thinks the Village would benefit from the fields by making the fields accessible to local kids that love to play the sport. He thinks it will encourage kids to

participate in the sport. He likes the idea of kids being able to ride their bikes to soccer practice. He thinks it will help advertise our great community. It will also help some of the small businesses in the area. He stated 10 minutes can make a big difference for some families. He stated it is important to build relationships with other communities.

Kurt Darrow, 2426 Brisbane, stated he has lived here for 19 years and he is not in favor of the soccer fields. He stated there are other parks all around. He lives on a street where the park's second exit will come out, if put through. He stated his son and 2 daughters grew up here and his wife is from here. He thinks it will cause too much traffic in an already congested area. He fears it will be too much and it is loud enough living right there already. He stated he thinks there are many other parks that these fields could be put in. He is not ok with knocking down all of the trees to make room for them. He noted those soccer fields do not benefit him in any way, a long time tax payer. He stated he might be ok with one field but no more than that.

Chief Ellsworth introduced Steve Grunwald and indicated that he has completed the Reserve Academy at his own expense. He believes he will be a great fit in the community. He stated Reserve Officers are a secondary officer, always under direct supervision of an officer, who helps out in busy times.

12. C. 2. RC 5/10/2018 19938 UPDATE ON CLARA MILLER PARK MASTER PLAN.

Magee stated he wanted to give a general overview of the proposed plan for the fields. He stated we have been going through Clara Miller Park Review since summer or fall of last year. Council held a public hearing in October of last year and engaged our Planning Consultant to come up with a new Clara Miller Master Plan; not with intention of greatly changing the park, but to look for ways to make better use of it. During that time the Village had a couple of different organizations come forward interested in contributing time, money and equipment for some of the improvements. One was Samantha Smiles which does playground equipment for children with special needs. They actually picked Dodge Park for this equipment. The other was a proposal from the CW3 Soccer Organization to build a couple of fields. That would happen where there are currently 2 baseball fields and one soccer field. They would build the fields at their expense and then maintain them. The best configuration is what is on display. The two baseball fields would be for practice only so their overlapping outfields would not be a problem. He stated Council is working on a Master Plan now. He stated the Administrator will give an update on that and hopefully Council can set a date for a second public hearing. He stated it has been mentioned that this was something Council was just pushing through and noted it has been discussed at almost every meeting for awhile. There was also information included in the Newsletter.

Magee stated the Master Plan will include all parks as well, not just Clara Miller. He stated he is glad to have people here and happy to get input from the residents.

Magee stated the planned soccer hours for CW3 has been spring and fall, they don't actually do anything in the summer. It would be practices on weekdays and games on weekends. It would not be getting rid of the baseball fields, just moving them.

Sienkiewicz stated he is not in favor of this. He stated it is Clara Miller, Village of Wolverine Lake Park. If this is done, we have lost part of the ownership to that park. He noted there are all kinds of other places that these fields could be built. He stated 2 fields with 2 teams would mean 15 kids per team which is 30 kids on each field. He stated that equals 60 kids that were brought by one or more parent. When one game is ending, there are another 60 kids waiting to come on the field and play. This means when a resident wants to go to the park, they will not have a place to park. He noted the Village would be putting quite a bit of money into this by paying for the parking and paving. He has nothing against soccer, but there is plenty of vacant land that could be used, not the park. He stated everyone that butts up to the park or lives within a block should not have to deal with all of the noise that would come with it. He thinks it will take the use of the park away from Village residents and he is not for it.

Scott stated the Village has the ability to engage areas of the park to service the entire community. He stated most parks are completely built out and there are not areas to put in a soccer field. He stated his kids grew up playing soccer playing in the outfield of a school yard. He stated CW3 would be bringing nearly \$200,000.00 to groom these fields. He stated they are going to be at a level of professionalism. He stated there will be noise but noise is associated with a park.

Burd stated at the last meeting Council hoped to have a draft of the Master Plan by the middle of this month with the hope of having a public hearing early in June. He stated the Park Planner indicated a more realistic time frame would be to have a draft by the end of the month. He noted Council could then schedule a public hearing toward the end of June to be sure to have enough time to advertise it.

MOTION by Duff, seconded by Scott, to open the discussion to the public, as presented.

All in favor.

Bob Malek, 1620 Thurston, stated two months ago Council talked about this. He stated he lives in Spring Lake Heights and Connecticut Street, which is in his neighborhood, backs up to the park. He asked what would be done to help those people keep their tranquility. He has heard nothing about putting up privacy fences or anything like that. He noted these people have lived here for years and deserve respect and privacy. He stated this park is not big enough to accommodate two soccer fields and the community who want to use the park.

Jeff Miller, 2612 Brisbane, stated his concern would be the extra traffic coming out onto Brisbane. He also noted it appears that this organization is buying the park and kicking the residents out. He doesn't care how nice it is, the fact is the residents cannot use it unless they are not on it. He asked what would be the benefit of doing this for the community. He noted that no one has addressed the issue of the restroom. He stated those are old systems, on septic and asked who was going to pay for it when they have to be updated. He does not see a benefit to any of the residents.

Kylee Dorcey, 2425 Brisbane, stated her backyard backs up to the park. She stated she has lived in her house for 6 years. She noted one of the main reasons she moved into that house was because of the park and general sense of community. She sees people walking their dogs or riding their bikes. She stated it is a beautiful open space with the trees. She stated she is very concerned with any changes to the park. She stated there is already a soccer field there that is not used; the baseball fields are used the most as well as the play structures for the children. She stated she has looked at past meeting minutes and the hours for soccer would be Saturday and Sunday and weekday evenings from 5pm-8pm, which is when the park is used the most by the residents. Again, you are taking away from the residents so that CW3 can come in. She doesn't think adding more traffic to this area is a good idea. There are people walking and kids riding their bikes and feels it would be unsafe. She is concerned about the noise this would bring. She stated the noise that is there already is tolerable but bringing in these teams and the parents and grandparents would create much more noise. She stated she is a health care professional and there is a lot of research on the benefit of open spaces and stress relief. The natural beauty would be taken away.

Donna Bothell, 807 Laguna, stated in looking at the proposed parking lot, it would require removal of a lot of trees. She stated it seems anti-park to clear cut it and pave it. She stated she can hear the kids playing ball at the park on the north side of Glengary and can hear the band practices at the high school. A little of this is ok but a lot can be nerve wracking. She stated putting an exit on Brisbane would create a lot of cut through traffic and people walk and bike through there.

Traci Progar, 2436 Woodlawn Street, stated he has a lot of red flags with the plan. He stated long term, after years down the road, there will be issues with maintaining the parking lot and what if soccer is not the thing anymore. In the meantime CW3 is making good money off of these sporting events while the community would be losing out. He stated since the stop signs have been removed along Woodlawn, they have seen a great deal more traffic and higher speeds. He stated adding a parking lot that close to the homes; he is not in favor of it. He stated the community uses the park and this would be taking it away from them. He is against this.

Steve Wozniak, 2394 Ellington, stated he lives across the street from the park. He stated it is a very nice, quiet park. The proposed plan looks like a condominium complex going in. Everything would be crammed. He stated there will not be enough parking and overflow will end up on the streets. He sees this as a safety issue with the increased traffic. He stated he uses the park almost every day.

Larry Jones, 2570 Canal Drive, asked about the proposed park on Oak Island. He stated there is a sign up but nothing else. Magee stated there were a few legal entanglements on that particular park. He stated that has been all worked out and they plan to put together a proposal for that park after the completion of the one on Amenia.

Kurt Darrow, 2426 Brisbane, stated this will not benefit the people who live here. His kids, with their friends, head over to the park all the time. They will not be able to do this because people

who are using it don't live in the neighborhood. He stated there is no benefit in this for the community. He stated if Council wants to do this, scale it down. One soccer field and one baseball field and no throughway.

Terri Barletta, 1450 Connecticut, stated he got a message from a neighbor and went through some of the previous meeting minutes. He stated he is a registered architect and professional engineer and works for one of the largest construction companies in the Country. He stated he makes his living building soccer fields. He helped build Tiger's stadium and fields at U of M. He stated his daughter lives directly behind the soccer fields put in at Dodge Park and it is not pleasant at times. He stated none of the residents near the park will be happy about this. He stated they will demand a traffic study and a water pollution prevention plan be in place. He stated the noise ordinance will have to be enforced. He stated there will be increased traffic on Glengary. It would require additional policing and privacy screening. If a Brisbane entrance/exit is put through, they would fight for it to be a gated access only. He stated he wants to make sure the residents are number one. He stated he supports Council but is against this.

Mike Dorsey, 2425 Brisbane, stated he is a retired builder and has worked all over the State of Michigan. He stated many communities go out of their way to buy homes or buildings to create parks similar to Clara Miller. He has never worked in a community where they took a community park and turned it into a commercial entity. He doesn't understand why this is even being discussed. The health benefits of open space are numerous. The traffic problems this would cause are astronomical. Wolverine Lake has 3 major assets; the lake, the parks and the residents. The Village cannot let a commercial entity come in and compromise two of those.

Magee stated just for clarification CW3 is a nonprofit organization. Mr. Dorsey stated he is not going to address that at this time. He stated they are making an awful lot of money. He asked if anyone on Council had a relative involved with CW3. Duff stated his son plays for them.

Magee closed the call to the public.

Magee thanked everyone for taking the time to give their input. He stated Council does take it seriously and are trying to get as much public input from everyone in the community on this proposal. He stated the park is a big asset for this community and why Council is taking their time and getting as much information as they can. He stated they will try to get everyone updated as much as possible and let everyone know when the second public hearing will be. He stated if Council has the draft of the master plan by the end of the month, he would suggest setting a public hearing date at the end of June. Sienkiewicz stated he would suggest having the public hearing at the regular Council meeting in July. Magee stated he would not be opposed to that. The July Council meeting will be July 12.

Scott asked the proposed Master Plan be put on the web site for residents to view, before the public hearing. He thought all information involved should be made public. Magee stated full transparency would be best.

MOTION by Sienkiewicz, seconded by Duff, to tentatively schedule presentation of Park Master Plan and public hearing for July 12, 2017, regularly scheduled Council meeting, as presented.

Magee again thanked everyone for coming and giving their input. He appreciates everyone is passionate about the parks and the lake. He stated they as a Council, are trying to make sure they are being as transparent as possible with what they are looking at and get public input before any decisions are made.

12. D. 1. RC 5/10/2017 19939 RECOMMENDATION FROM THE PLANNING COMMISSION – MOTION TO APPOINT CATHY MORETTO AS THE ZBA LIAISON FOR A ONE YEAR TERM EXPIRING ON DECEMBER 31, 2017..

MOTION by Nedrow, seconded by Scott, to appoint Cathy Moretto as the Zoning Board of Appeals Liaison for a one year term expiring on December 31, 2017, as presented.

12. D. 2. RC 5/10/2017 19940 TRASH CONTRACT.

Magee stated this came up on Monday and was a bit of surprise.

Administrator Burd stated he met with the representative from Republic who informed him they will no longer be operating their business in our area. The Village currently is in the early stages of a five year contract extension with them so Council needs to talk about what this means. The Village contract will be assigned to a different company. Everything will stay the same including pricing. He stated there is a provision in the contract that allows for to happen. Magee asked who the new company would be. Burd stated GFL (Green for Life) they are a company that has taken over a lot of the Rizzo contracts in the area.

The representative from Republic stated Republic Services has made a business decision to divest of some of their residential work that operates out of Pontiac. There are five municipal contracts which include the Village of Wolverine Lake. What this means is the contract that was recently negotiated and extended, will remain the same. GFL is purchasing the contract and all services will remain the same. He stated it was not an easy decision, but a business decision that made sense. He noted Commerce will remain a Republic customer but noted they had a little bit of a different legal contract. He stated he found out on Monday and immediately scheduled a meeting with the Administrator.

Elowsky stated GFL is a Canadian company that took over Rizzo last fall. She stated these changes with Waste Collection companies are fairly common. She stated many local communities are now using GFL and she has not seen any change in service or problems. She stated there are a couple of things she would like to add to the contract. She asked that if approved tonight, that it be conditional on Attorney tweaking some of the language.

Administrator Burd stated he has a meeting with a representative from GFL on Monday, May 22, 2017.

Sienkiewicz stated Council just renegotiated the contract a few months ago. He finds it hard to believe that this just came up. The representative stated he just found out last week.

Scott asked about what kind of equipment GFL uses. The representative stated it will be similar to what the Village has seen in the past.

Magee stated as far as he knows, GFL has a very good reputation. He noted if Council does not approve the change, the Village will have to go out for bids again. It is his understanding the Village has a favorable contract. He thinks it is to our advantage to keep it.

Burd asked when the Village would likely see the change in service. The representative stated probably June 5th.

MOTION by Sienkiewicz, seconded by Nedrow, to approve the reassignment of trash contract from Republic to GFL, subject to the Attorney's review and approval and also the Administrator's approval after the meeting on May 22nd with GFL representative, as presented.

County Clerk Office they can come to Village Hall next Thursday. He stated there is a flyer regarding this available on the web site.

Burd stated Council decided to name Joanne Sullivan for the Cliff Cottrell Memorial. He stated her event will be held on June 2 at 4pm. He asked if anyone is planning to attend please let Village Hall know so it can be planned accordingly.

Burd stated the Village has updated the web site and there are a lot of events and activities coming up.
